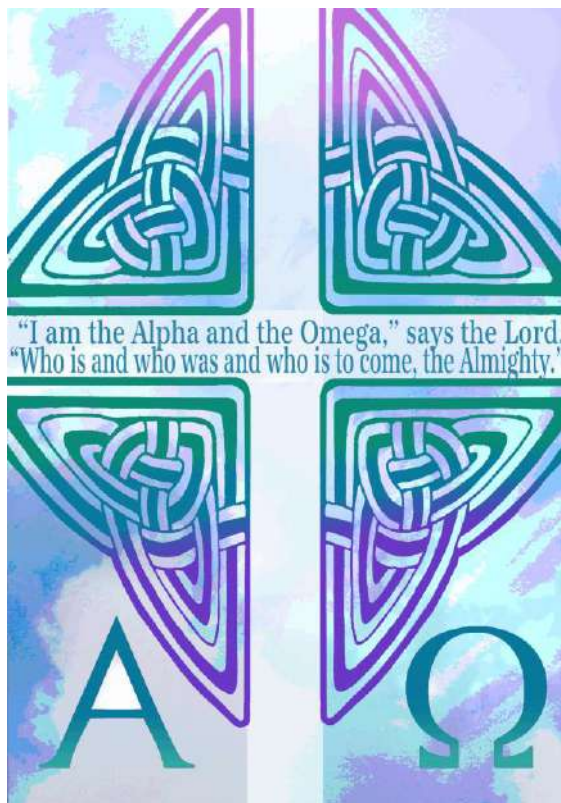

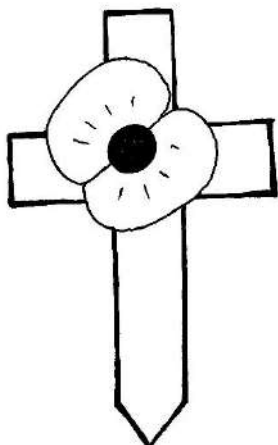

A month of Remembering



The beginning of autumn brings shorter days and longer nights which seem to call us to a time of remembrance.

We remember all our loved ones who have died in the 'All Souls' memorial services on November 5th; and then on November 12th we hold Remembrance Day services to remember the many service men and women who have died; not only those who died in the first and second World Wars, but service men and

women who have also died in battle since 1945.

We need to continue to remember those who die in war, because most did not chose to be where they were when they were killed; they went where they were sent and paid a high price to protect the world from the madness of dictatorship and to ensure that this country remained a democracy.

When we remember those who have died in war, we do it not to glorify war, but to give our profound thanks to those who died so that we can keep our freedom.

I hate war. *But* I do not hate soldiers. I believe the teaching of Jesus that killing is wrong. *But* I respect the fact that war veterans have made incredible sacrifices and that those who died must be remembered for paying the ultimate sacrifice.

On Remembrance Day, we are honouring the spirit of sacrifice but not the acts of destruction; we are giving thanks for the selfless nature of those who died while recognising that we hope it never has to happen again.

We remember on Remembrance Day - because the best way to honour all those who died in war is to make sure there are as few new War Veterans as possible; and as we remember, we pray for the leaders of the nations, that when disputes arise, they will seek solutions in diplomacy and reconciliation instead of conflict.

Maybe this November we could all make some time in our daily lives to pray specifically for peace between the nations and for God's love to be spread through all the world.

Local History Corner

Extracts from the Parish Magazine August 1907

Creswell Feast

The Vicar wrote that the rumour that he objected to Creswell Feast was wrong. He explained that he did request the Duke's Agent to keep the patch of ground in Duke Street next to the schools in the Duke's hands instead of letting it. Caravans were parked there all year and there was a serious danger to health because no sanitary arrangements were in place. He said that there was enough fever in Creswell without this cause. Evidently the Feast was a failure according to the Vicar because the authorities in the village were under the impression that they understood ecclesiastical laws far better than he did and entirely disregarded his warning as to the date (July 22nd) when the Feast would fall.

(In later years Harry Hall's Fair came annually to Creswell from Derby and used the recreation ground between Welbeck Street and Duke Street. Two traction engines, one called Lord Kitchener, pulled trailers and showmen's caravans to the ground. They brought Dodgem cars, Noah's Ark, Swish, Cranky Horses, a Children's Roundabout plus all the side stalls- roll a penny, coconut shy, test your strength etc. Coal was supplied to fire the traction engine which generated electricity needed by the rides and stalls.)

Day School

At the Creswell Day School, two girls Norah Noble and Elsie Mitchell passed the County Scholarship Exam. (After 1944 many more Creswell children passed the 11plus and went on to further education.)

Sunday School Teachers Outing

On Saturday August 21st an outing for the Sunday School Teachers was arranged. The party set off in three brakes (wagons with seats) and five cycles. They started at 11a.m and drove to Welbeck. The Housekeeper there, a Mrs. Marshall, kindly showed them over some of the chief rooms in the Abbey including bedrooms occupied by kings and queens who had stayed. They went in the library and looked at the many framed letters from royalty and Prime Ministers. From there they went on to Carburton and Clumber Church. They lost their way in Clumber until Lime Tree Avenue was found and then they travelled on to Edwinstowe for tea and a return home.

Garden Party

A Garden Party was given by Mrs. Bearder, wife of the Rev. N.J. Bearder in the grounds of the Vicarage in Elmton. The weather

wasn't too good but the old and young played games and the members of the Girls Friendly Society gave an amusing sketch. Mrs. Bearder was presented with two silver vases as she and her husband were leaving after a stay of two years.

Mining Accident

A fatal pit accident occurred on Friday August 20th when Albert Robinson was killed. He left a wife and six children.

(He was one of the many men who lost their lives in different accidents at the pit over the years.)

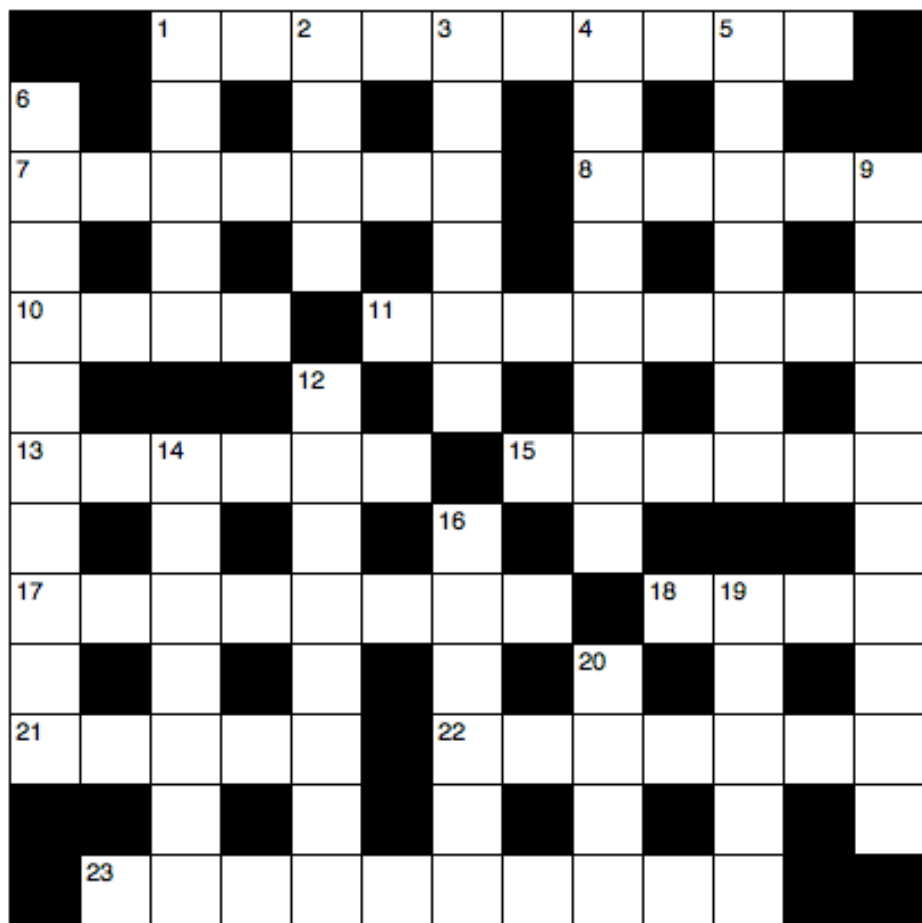

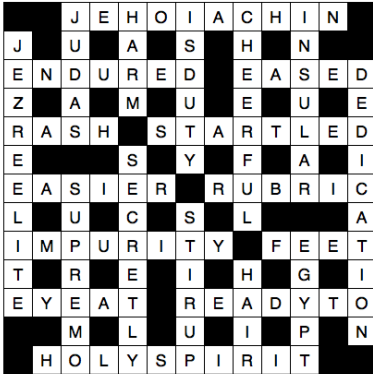

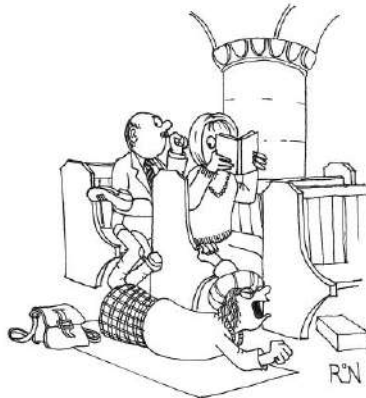

Illtud – patron saint of NGOs?

Not many people have heard of Illtud, but perhaps we should make him the patron saint of all Christian NGOs (Non-Government Organisations) who work in emergency and famine relief.

Illtud did not set out to be an action hero – he was a gentle and learned abbot heading up a monastery in Glamorgan. Illtud spent his days reading the Scriptures and philosophy. Yet the year that famine struck the coast of Brittany, Illtud put down his parchments and became a man of action. Illtud issued what must have been one of the earliest 'emergency relief appeals', and was able to collect a great deal of corn. Illtud loaded this corn onto several small ships, and set off across the perilous Channel in order to save the people of Brittany. Perhaps he had in mind the words of Christ: "I was hungry and you fed me..." (Matthew 25:35)

Certainly, the people of Brittany never forgot Illtud's kindness towards them: even today some Breton churches and villages bear his name. Many churches in Wales are also compassionate man.

Recipe for the month.



Old Fashioned Apple Jelly Recipe:

Ingredients:

- 4 pounds/1.8 kilos of cooking apples (windfalls are fine for this recipe)
- 2 UK pints/1140ml/5 cups of water
- Grated rind and juice of one large lemon
- White granulated sugar (the amount depends on the volume of juice extracted from the simmered, drained fruit. 1 pint/500ml/2 1/2 cups of juice to 1 pound/454gms of sugar. I always make sure that I have a 2 kilo bag of sugar in the larder, just in case I fancy making jelly)

Method:

1. Wash the apples, cut out bad bits and chop roughly. There is no need to peel and core the apples.
2. Carefully grate the lemon zest from the lemon (we use a zester but a fine grater will do. Try to avoid including the pith as this would make the jelly bitter).
3. Place fruit and lemon zest in a large deep heavy bottomed saucepan, or preserving pan. Add the water and bring gently. Bring gently to the boil and simmer very gently until all the fruit is soft and mushy (roughly 25 minutes, depending upon how ripe the fruit is).
4. Pour the cooked fruit through sterilised muslin. (How do I sterilise muslin? See tips and tricks below). The muslin is often referred to as a "jelly bag". We use tall buckets to catch the drips from the jelly bags. Rather than hang the bags (conventional method-between two stools) I find it easier to line a large plastic sieve with the muslin. This clips neatly onto the top of a clean bucket. The sieve is covered with a clean tea cloth to protect against flies, as the jelly bag generally drips overnight.
5. Measure the apple juice the next day and pour it into a deep heavy bottomed saucepan. Add 454g/1 pound of white granulated sugar for each 570ml/1 pint/2 1/2 cups of juice.
6. Add the juice of the lemon.
7. Heat the juice and sugar gently, stirring from time to time. Make sure that that all the sugar has dissolved before bringing the liquid slowly to the boil. Continue to boil for about five minutes before testing for a set. (What is testing for a set? See tips and tricks below).
8. Toss in a nugget of butter towards the end to reduce the frothing that often occurs.
9. When jelly has reached setting point pour into warm sterilised jars using a funnel and ladle. (How do I sterilise jars? See tips and tricks below).
10. Cover immediately with plastic lined screw top lids or cellophane tops secured with a rubber band.
Label when cold and store in a cool, dark place. Away from damp.

All Souls' Day – a time of reckoning with the past

The early Church was slow to dedicate a liturgical day to offering prayers and masses to commemorate the faithful departed. But in time prayers were offered on behalf of dead monks, that they might attain 'the Beatific Vision' through purification, which the Church later described as Purgatory. Odilo, the powerful abbot of Cluny, (d 1049) decreed that All Souls' Day should follow the feast of All Saints' Day.

At least four ancient English dedications are known, the most famous of which are All Souls College, Oxford and the church in Langham Place in London.

In bygone centuries All Souls' Day was certainly uncomfortable for anyone who had wronged a person who had then died. For it was believed that souls in purgatory could appear on earth on this day, in the form of ghosts, witches or toads, to haunt anyone who had wronged them in life.

On a more cheerful note, it was also believed that you could help the dead on this day by almsgiving in cash or in kind. Some of these beliefs seem to have been caught up in the popular customs of Hallowe'en.

When the Reformation came, the Protestants disregarded the idea of Purgatory, and this feast day remained with the Roman Catholic Church.

All Saints' Day – the feast day of all the redeemed

All Saints, or All Hallows, is the feast of all the redeemed, known and unknown, who are now in heaven. When the English Reformation took place, the number of saints in the calendar was drastically reduced, with the result that All Saints' Day stood out with a prominence that it had never had before.

This feast day first began in the East, perhaps as early as the 5th century, as commemorating 'the martyrs of the whole world'. A Northern English 9th century calendar named All Hallows as a principal feast, and such it has remained. Down the centuries devotional writers have seen in it the fulfilment of Pentecost and indeed of Christ's redemptive sacrifice and resurrection.

The saints do not belong to any religious tradition, and their lives and witness to Christ can be appreciated by all Christians. Richard Baxter, writing in the 17th century, wrote the following:

He wants not friends that hath thy love,
And made converse and walk with thee,
And with thy saints here and above,
With whom for ever I must be...

As for my friends, they are not lost;
The several vessels of thy fleet,
Though parted now, by tempests tost,
Shall safely in thy haven meet....

The heavenly hosts, world without end,
Shall be my company above;
And thou, my best and surest Friend,
Who shall divide me from thy love?*

1,255 ancient English churches were dedicated to All Saints - a number only surpassed by those dedicated to the Virgin Mary. (Steetley Chapel is dedicated to All Saints)
