A month of Remembering

The beginning of autumn brings shorter days and longer nights which seem to call us to a time of remembrance.

We remember all our loved ones who have died in the 'All Souls' memorial services on November 5th and then, on November 12th, we hold Remembrance Day services to remember the many service men and women who have died; not only those who died in the first and second World Wars, but service men and women who have also died in battle since 1945.

We need to continue to remember those who die in war, because most did not chose to be where they were when they were killed; they went where they were sent and paid a high price to protect the world from the madness of dictatorship and to ensure that this country remained a democracy.

When we remember those who have died in war, we do it not to glorify war, but to give our profound thanks to those who died so that we can keep our freedom.

I hate war, but I do not hate soldiers. I believe the teaching of Jesus that killing is wrong, but I respect the fact that war veterans have made incredible sacrifices and that those who died must be remembered for paying the ultimate sacrifice.

On Remembrance Day, we are honouring the spirit of sacrifice but not the acts of destruction; we are giving thanks for the selfless nature of those who died while recognising that we hope it never has to happen again.


We remember on Remembrance Day because the best way to honour all those who died in war is to make sure there are as few new War Veterans as possible and as we remember, we pray for the leaders of the nations that, when disputes arise, they will seek solutions in diplomacy and reconciliation instead of conflict.

The Counties of England (18) – Surrey

The name Surrey comes from a Saxon word meaning southern region. It is regarded as a 'posh' county, although this has not always been the case as at one time Londoners were glad to pass through it on the way to Brighton and the Sussex coast, without taking much notice. Things changed in the Victorian Age with the coming of railways, making it possible for people to have good jobs in London and yet live elsewhere, which was to the county's advantage. Surrey is not large in area and can be divided into two parts, suburban Surrey near to London with its endless houses and roof tops, and rural Surrey with its villages and pleasant scenery. It is also famous for fine houses designed by such famous Victorian architects as Sir Edwin Lutyens and Norman Shaw.

The Thames is the northern boundary of 'historic' Surrey, although the north is now swallowed up by the boroughs of Greater London, such as Lambeth, or districts like Vauxhall, with The Oval the home of Surrey CCC, yet whose population see themselves entirely as Londoners. Wimbledon needs no reminder for being the home of tennis and there are also a number of famous golf clubs, while the Derby is run on Epsom Downs. Until 1936 the Crystal Palace district was the site of that structure, moved there from Hyde Park after the Great Exhibition of 1851. Nowadays, scores of showbiz people live in Weybridge.

The dominant feature of rural Surrey is undoubtedly the chalk hill region or North Downs, much being heath and woodland. It attracts countless motorists, bikers and walkers from the metropolis to beauty spots such as Box Hill, the Hog's Back, between Farnham and Guildford, the Devil's Punch Bowl at Hazlemere and Hindhead, Newlands Corner near Guildford and Leith Hill, which has an imposing tower to make it a thousand feet in height. Across the Downs, of old, ran the Pilgrim's Way from Winchester to Canterbury.

Towns close to London worthy of mention include Richmond, Croydon and Kingston (the county town) while further south, beyond the M25, lie Farnham, whose castle was once the seat of the bishops of Winchester and Guildford, with a fine castle, a twentieth century cathedral on a hill above the housing estates and a new university. Nearby is Dorking which holds the Leith Hill Music Festival, Leatherhead and finally Reigate/Redhill.

There are many pleasant villages in these parts, the most notable being Shere, Abinger, Brockham (famous for its November Fireworks), Cold Harbour, Chiddingfold and Friday Street. It is worth remembering that Magna Charta Island, where King John met his barons in 1215 to seal their famous agreement, is on the Thames and in Surrey.

Lacking good building stone locally, Surrey is not noted for historic churches, although Compton (near Guildford) Stoke D'Abernon, Chaldon and Shere are of interest. The many famous houses include Ham (at Richmond), Kew Palace and Gardens and the foundations only of Henry VIII's great palace of Nonesuch, while at Richmond Palace only a gate remains. Clandon, a fine Georgian house near Guildford was destroyed by fire recently, although it is to be restored. Loseley, an Elizabethan house is popular with many visitors.


Bible Bite

They needed more food so they had to take Benjamin to Egypt.




Joseph gave them food...

Recipe of the month

Creamy Tarragon Chicken Bake

This dish is gluten, egg and dairy free; the perfect dinner party dish for those with intolerances (should intolerances not be an issue, you can, of course, substitute standard ingredients)

Ingredients

2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
1 tbsp rice flour
300 ml soya milk
4 chicken breast (skin removed)
2 red onions (cut into wedges)
250g punnet cherry tomatoes, halved
250g asparagus spears (blanched)
1 tsp caster sugar
1 tbsp white wine vinegar
150 ml vegetable stock (kallo yeast free vegetable stock)
3 tbsp chopped tarragon
4 tbsp gluten free breadcrumbs
1 tbsp grated dairy and lactose free cheese

Method

- Mix half the oil and flour in a saucepan (off the heat)
- Blend in the soya milk (it must be well blended before heating)
- Bring the sauce slowly to the boil, whisking constantly
- Simmer for 1 minute
- Remove from the heat, cover with greaseproof paper and set aside
- Heat oven to 200°C / fan 180°C / gas 6
- Heat remaining oil in a frying pan
- Add the chicken and fry for 2-3 minutes until brown (it won't be cooked through)

- Transfer to an oven proof gratin dish
- Add onions to the pan and fry for 2-3 minutes
- Spoon over the chicken, then top with tomatoes and asparagus. Set aside while you prepare the sauce.
- Put the sugar and vinegar into the pan
- Stir over a medium heat until the sugar is a dark caramel colour, then add the stock
- Bring to the boil and simmer for 1 minute
- Whisk into the milky sauce until blended
- Season, then add the tarragon
- Spoon the sauce over the chicken and veg
- Sprinkle with crumbs and cheese
- Bake for 20 minutes or until cooked through

So, apparently I'm still lost....




Website Launched

We Remember


The Somme, Dunkirk and Passchendaele


