Editor's note

A Plastic Revolution

The recent Blue Planet II series exposed just how much plastic waste is an issue in our seas. The Prime Minister has called plastic waste '*one of the great environmental scourges of our time.*' The best estimates suggest 10 million tonnes of plastic ends up in our oceans, contaminating and killing sea life. How should we view this issue from a Christian perspective?

When God created the universe, He saw '*everything He had made, and indeed, it was very good.*' (Genesis 1:31). He calls us to share in His care of creation: '*Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves on the ground.*' (Genesis 1:28). Our *rule* over living creatures is not an excuse to exploit them in a selfish way. As those who made in the image of God, we are entrusted to care for them with responsibility and trustworthiness.

Why do the sea creatures being killed by plastic matter? Because of human rebellion against God (see Genesis 3), our relationship with God and His creation was damaged. No longer do we live with living creatures in harmony and interdependence. Yet after the flood, when Noah rescued the animals in the ark, they are included in God's everlasting promise to protect the earth: '*I now establish my covenant with you and with your descendants after you, and with every living creature that was with you.*' (Genesis 9:9,10). This also points to God's cosmic plan to restore all creation to Himself.

What is our response to be? Where is God calling us, as His people in this time and place, to make a stand in protecting His creation? Time for a plastic revolution?

RECIPE OF THE MONTH



Beetroot and Potato Salad

Ingredients

150g Salad potatoes

3 cooked beetroots, cut into ¼'s

2 spring onions, chopped

½ bag watercress, large stalks removed

1 packet cress

For the dressing

1 table spoon low fat Crème fraich

2 tsp.mayonnaise

1 tsp grain mustard

Juice of ½ a lemon

A pinch of poppy seeds

Method

Cook the potatoes in salted boiling water until tender. Drain and leave to cool a little then slice into bite sized pieces.

Take a large mixing bowl and whisk together all the ingredients for the dressing. Whilst the potatoes are still warm toss them into the dressing along with the spring onions.

Roughly chop the watercress, fold into the salad with the beetroot but don't mix too vigorously otherwise the salad will go pink. Just before serving sprinkle over the cress and serve.

To spice it up try stirring in squares of crispy bacon.

LOCAL HISTORY CORNER



QUEEN VICTORIA'S DIAMOND JUBILEE



On June 20th 1897 the people of Elmton and Creswell celebrated the 60years reign of Queen Victoria.

On that day they joined together for services and thanksgiving in church, although the weather wasn't too good and prevented some from attending. The flag of Saint George fluttered above Elmton Church and Union Jacks decorated the interior.

Special hymns were sung at the services with children from the School Choir helping out. The Vicar, the Rev.C.W.Tibbits, preached sermons " suitable to the occasion ", first at a service in the afternoon for children, who attended in large numbers, and then for adults in the evening. The vicar had given a formal invitation to the Parish Council to attend one of the services, but no reply had been received. The Vicar made no comment on this other than saying that he hoped they had gone to Chapel instead. Evidently he was not pleased.

Both villages were decorated and flags put up on the houses. In Elmton the villagers collected £17 for the celebrations and flags were displayed on the old Elm Tree on the Green and others around the village. Here the first ceremony of the day was the cutting of the sod on the Green in order that a Jubilee tree could be planted.Mr Francis Shaw an 80 year old resident who was a forester to the Duke of Portland, performed the duty, using a spade presented by the Vicar.

The village men ate roast beef, mutton and plum pudding at the Elm Tree Inn. The children ,after a souvenir medal presentation by Miss E.Cox of Elmton Park, had tea and then it was the women's turn to have a ham tea.

Mr.Breedon's field in the village was the scene of further celebrations. Every child also received a toy and Mr.J.Rogers distributed nuts and spice- a general term used in our area for sweets. Here the boys played cricket, young girls danced to a violin, the women sat and gossiped and men smoked their pipes. Two of the oldest inhabitants who had recently been housebound came out to enjoy the festivities along with their neighbours. They were the former schoolteacher in the village, Mr.James Cropper and Mr.JohnJackson of the Elm Tree Inn.

At night a fire balloon was sent up and all strained to watch it disappear in the sky. A perfect finish to the day.

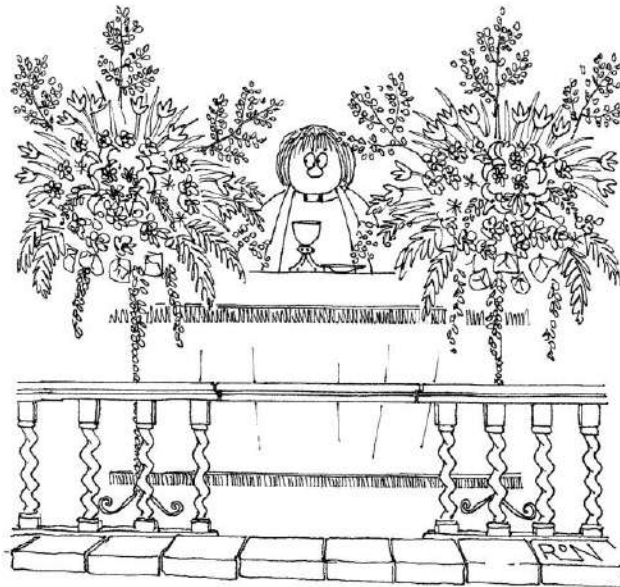
N.B.

Francis Shaw died 18th September 1901 and his wife died 17th February 1880. They are buried on the left hand side of the path up to the church and overlooking Spring Lane.

Francis Shaw was painted by James Baldock of Worksop dressed in a smocked shirt, round brimmed hat and carrying a hay rake. This portrait can be seen in Retford Museum.

A blue brick with "1837-1897" pressed into the underside of it was found in an Elmton garden some time ago. These were very hard bricks usually found on stable floors so that the hooves of horses did no damage to the floor.

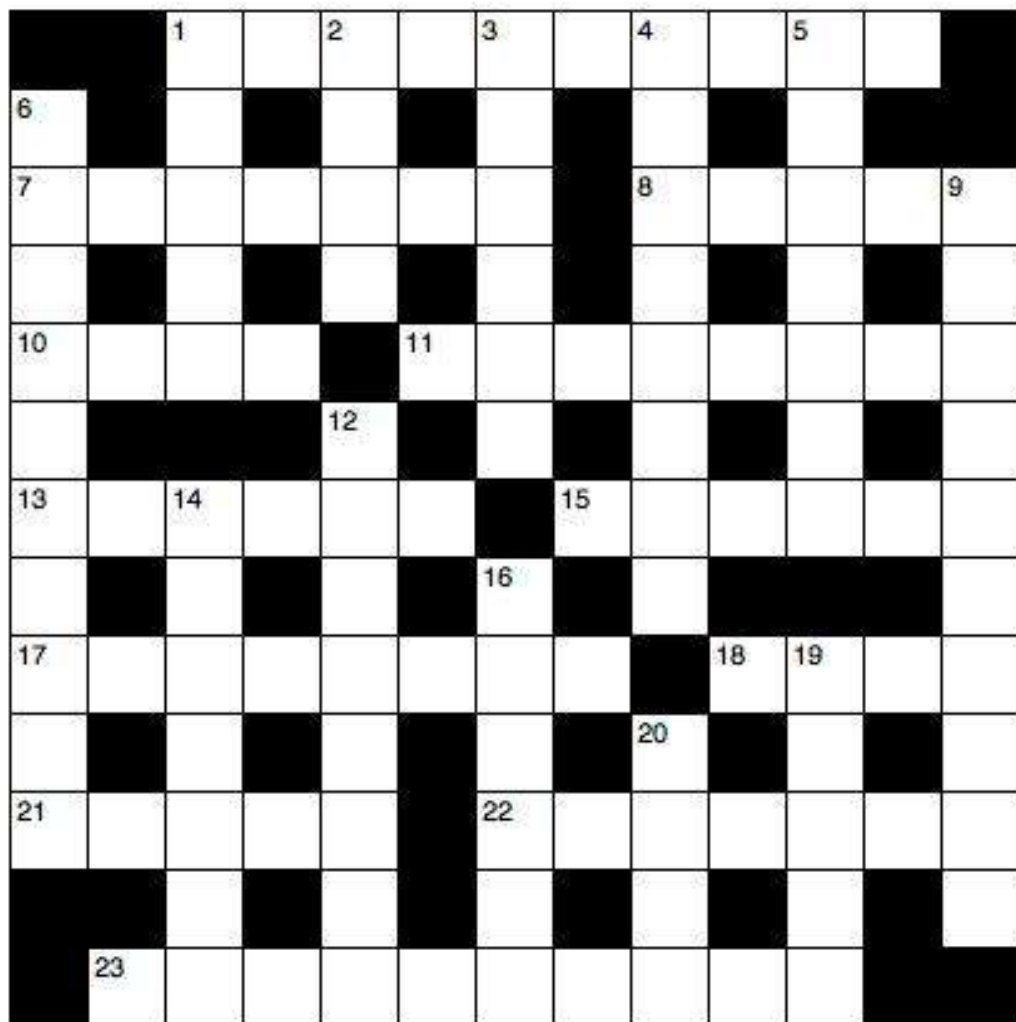

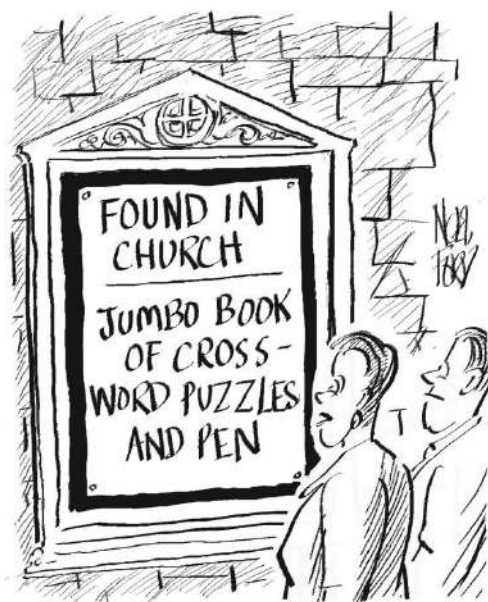

Editor (Parish Pump): Ever wonder who is eligible to become a Christian? Here the Ven John Barton, in the first of a two-part series, will consider the question

Who can become a Christian?

Once upon a time, Christianity was only available to Jews. That may astonish us. But equally, the first Christians, who were, after all, Jews, could not possibly have believed that one day they would be vastly outnumbered by non-Jewish Christians.

Sure, in those days Gentiles could become Christians, *but only if they became Jews first*. It both astounded and enraged many when St Paul and others said that wasn't necessary. There was a huge bust-up in the Church. It was officially resolved in 50 AD at a Church Council meeting, held in Jerusalem, but after that so-called 'Judaisers' said that Christians were bound by all the Jewish regulations. Even today, some Christians won't eat pork.

You and I take it for granted that we have equal rights of entry. We are encouraged by Bible verses, like this one: "Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all" (Col 3:1). Scythians, by the way were nomadic warriors from Siberia and you can't be more of an outsider than that!

Religions differ over entrance qualifications. Judaism says you are a Jew if you have a Jewish mother. In Islam, the Koran says all children are born Muslim – it's their parents who make them something else.

But if you want to be a Christian, where you were born and who your parents were, make no difference. No one is born a Christian. To be a Christian requires something outward and something inward. There are no racial, national, biological or genetic requirements.

There were hints, even in the OT, that God paints on a larger canvas than that. The magnificent OT reading from Isaiah has a universal vision of the future, when: "Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn". (Is 60.1-6)

The book of Ruth tells of the faithfulness of a non-Jewish widow, accepted by her late husband's Jewish family. Jonah is about a Jewish missionary who refused to preach to the Gentiles, because they might be converted, and he hated them. Right at the beginning when Abraham was called by God to leave the city of Ur (today's Iraq) to make a new start as the father of a new nation, it was to be a blessing to *all the nations*, not just his offspring.

Switch to the NT. Matthew's Gospel specialises in Jewish references, but the first visitors to the manger that he mentions are *foreigners. Magi from Iran.*

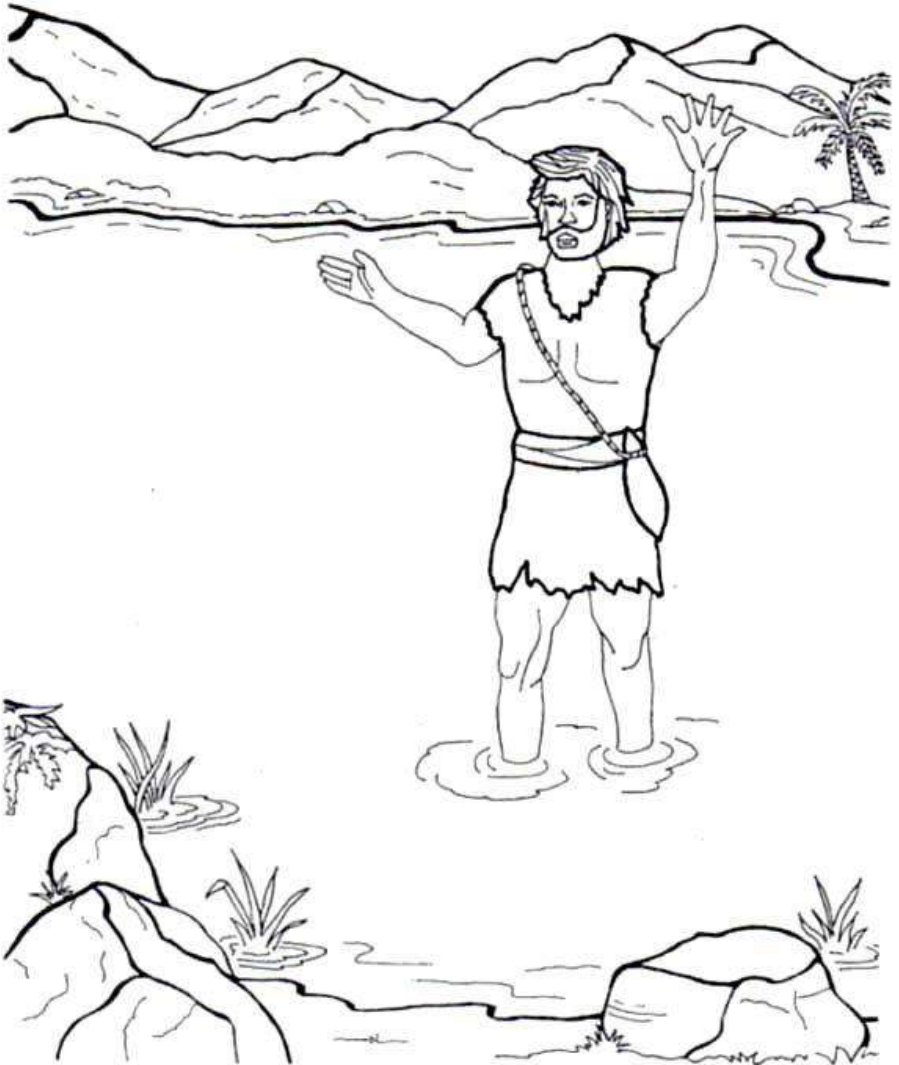

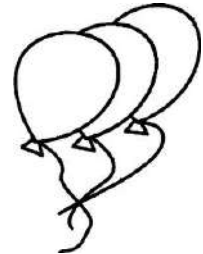
