




Rector's Letter

Dear Friends

A Christmas Meditation (Luke 2:1-20)

Luke is the gospel of the Christmas story. It has the journey to Bethlehem, the inn with no room, the birth in a manger, the angels and the shepherds. And it has Mary, pondering all these things in her heart. There's not much about Joseph though. The old pictures put him in a corner of the stable, looking very puzzled and rather glum, as he might well have been. For it was not that they had a baby (and they didn't quite understand how) but who the baby might be. As Luke tells the story, more than 80 years later, it is full of songs about the child to be born and who he is. The songs said he was somebody, someone great, someone from God. But it didn't look like that at all.

In fact, the baby looked utterly unimportant; he was just another peasant child, being nursed in a stable. And he grew up in Nazareth, a remote village if ever there was one. And when he brought together 12 friends and wandered round the country, healing people and telling stories they didn't quite understand (and some didn't want to understand), he seemed to so many people to be just a nobody. And then he was crucified, now an undesirable nobody, no better than a criminal, to be got rid of.

We know that when Jesus died it was not the end of the story. In fact, we believe that we can see in this nobody the human face of God, the eternal God made known to us. Jesus is the Word of God made flesh. That is what Mary sang about in the song of praise we call the Magnificat. God is on the side of the nobodies. It was the proud and the mighty who crucified Jesus. And on the cross we look into the face of divine love, the face of Jesus who was a nobody. As we do at Christmas, when we think of the way he was born.

If you visit Bethlehem, and go to the Basilica where Jesus was born, you have to bend low to enter the door of the church, which is barely 5 feet high. The high and mighty can't stride arrogantly into the church. And I suppose the shepherds and wise men had to bend low to enter the stable where the new-born Jesus lay, and there to worship and adore the face of divine love in the child who looked utterly unimportant.

Graham Kendrick's modern hymn, "The Servant King", speaks of how Jesus lived his life as a "Servant King" (or a divine nobody) and calls us to follow his example of humility and service to others. The first verse puts it like this:

From heaven you came, helpless babe,
Entered our world, your glory veiled;
Not to be served but to serve,
And give your life that we might live.

Christmas is the time to look into the face of Jesus the divine nobody and see there the wonder of the eternal God. And praise God that this nobody has mattered more than anyone else for so many people for more than 2,000 years.





Neighbouring Villages and Churches – 2 Clowne

On some historic maps Clowne is rendered as Clune and the spelling Clowne would seem to be fairly recent. In the Domesday Book (1086) it is named Clvne and is simply described as a taxable part of the manor of Barlborough/Whitwell.

The parish church, dedicated to St John the Baptist, is not one of the larger edifices in the district, although it has a fine perpendicular tower with battlements and pinnacles. The nave is basically Norman in character and it has no aisles. The chancel, though dating from the middle ages, was extended comparatively recently and a chapel was added as late as the 1950s. An altarpiece, now in the nave, originally came from the Netherlands and the ancient font has been altered in its details over the centuries. There is a gallery on the west side dating from the 1800s. The stained glass windows were added later and the miners' memorial was erected in 1950.

A slab in the chancel commemorates William Inskip (d. 1582) who was Rector for 54 years and survived all the Reformation changes. More recently, another long server was Revd Lawrence Harris who arrived in 1972 and stayed many years. He was a native of Whitwell and in retirement officiated at St Lawrence's during an interregnum. He is buried at Steetley. Revd F. Brabyn was also Rector there before moving to Whitwell in 1958. A large domed canopy at the churchyard entrance has been the subject of some adverse comment, since it obscures a view of the church.

Another notable building in the parish is the former Southgate House, a three storied structure of 1787 which had a Roman Catholic chapel added in 1902. It stands on the Worksop Road and is better known to us as Van Dyk Hotel. In area, Clowne is one of the smaller parishes and this is reflected in population size as it was only 600 in 1851, before the advent of a rapid rise to around 4,000 in the 1900s. This was largely due to coal mining.

Before that, the population was mainly engaged in agriculture. Farms were small by later standards with only half a dozen or around a hundred acres, so not many workers were needed on a full time basis. Most farms tended to specialise in wheat and oats with additional hands needed mainly at harvest time. The land was fairly equally split between arable and pasture and there were adequate areas of woodland. The first signs of industry came after 1800 when a spinning cotton mill was established at Harlesthorne. Initially powered by water from a pond, it was later driven by a steam engine. There was a textile factory in the village until recent times.

As stated, it was coal mining that led to the growth of the village, beginning with a small mine there as early as 1652 and the industry was dominant in the late Victorian Age. The Southgate colliery employed well over a thousand men in the 1920s, but was later abandoned due to flooding and plans to reopen did not come to fruition.

The railway network in its heyday was also much in evidence in the parish and older readers may remember that Clowne had two railway stations, both close to each other, one being the Midland line and the other on the North & East Coast line. Both were demolished about 1962.

Due to the rapid increase in village numbers in the 1890s, a Board School was established, effectively replacing an existing, though small, voluntary school. Secondary education in the district was developed and expanded during the course of the last century and when Markland School was closed in 1991, the school at Clowne was rebuilt and given the name 'Heritage'. The teaching of Maths is just one of its strong subjects. In conclusion, it does not need to be said that both Whitwell and Creswell children are able to attend it.



Local History Corner

Elmton with Creswell local history – Creswell Church of England Senior School 1928

Long before OFSTED came into being, schools were being inspected yearly. Two early headteachers of the above school were Mr Hogg and Mr Baker who both seemed to have a very modern approach for the time to teaching and the curriculum.

Although the senior school at this time was partly in the care of the LEA, the upkeep of the building was the responsibility of the church. The Rev William Kay complained that the council owned schools benefitted from the rates if repairs were needed but voluntary owned schools, such as the senior school needed the churchgoers to provide funding. To this end he was always having to organise fund raising events. However, in 1928 he was given the following report of the Inspector's views of this school which pleased him greatly.

Board of Education Report Senior Mixed

This school is highly organised and skilfully conducted by a headmaster of ripe experience and remarkable energy. During the period of review, the staff has been considerably strengthened and the classes have been reduced to a reasonable size. As a result there has been a steady improvement in the work in Composition, Arithmetic and Reading. Some very good results are obtained in History and Geography in the senior classes and the handwriting and spelling are particularly pleasing.

The singing is remarkably good; it is an example of true art, pure in tone, simple and sincere and it reflects admirably the spirit which animates the school.

The school garden is beautifully kept and in it the children learn much of scientific value. Bee-keeping is closely associated with

the gardening and manual instruction in a well-appointed workshop has been added to the curriculum.

Swimming was introduced last year and the instruction has met with great success, not only have many boys and girls learned to swim but the school team succeeded in winning the County Championship at the recent contest. (The children didn't have far to go for swimming lessons as the newly built baths was next to the school).

Parents would be very pleased to read this report and to know how well their children were being taught.

Recipe of the month

Chocolate raspberry roulade

This chocolate and raspberry roulade is still creamy and delicious, but not too heavy a pudding. It is the perfect way to finish off a festive feast.

Ingredients (serves 10)

For the sponge

Butter, for greasing
7 medium free-range eggs, separated
140g caster sugar
65g cocoa powder

For the filling

200ml double cream
75ml crème fraîche
100g raspberries
40g dark chocolate

Method

- Preheat the oven to 180°C/160°C Fan/Gas 4
- Line a 22x32cm Swiss roll tin, or tall-sided baking tray with baking paper and lightly grease with butter
- Whisk the egg yolks and sugar together in a bowl until thick
- Sieve over the cocoa powder and whisk in until full incorporated
- In a clean glass bowl using clean beaters, whisk the egg whites until stiff
- Fold them into the cocoa mixture a spoonful at a time
- Pour the mixture into the baking tin and spread out evenly
- Bake for 20 minutes

- Use a knife to cut the edges away from the tin, then leave to cool
- Turn the Swiss roll out on to a sheet of baking paper
- Whisk the double cream, then fold in the crème fraiche
- Using a spatula, spread this over the sponge
- Sprinkle over the raspberries
- Roll up from one of the short sides
- Melt the dark chocolate in a microwave or in a bowl over a pan of boiling water
- Drizzle the chocolate over the top of the cake
